

# Cape Jervis D6

Some of the State's best ocean and rural views can be found at Cape Jervis. This little town is the mainland port for the Sealink Kangaroo Island ferry and the beginning of the beautiful challenging Heysen Trail. Be sure to stop at the lookout before the ferry terminal and enjoy the panorama. Nearby the lighthouse can be viewed. Deep Creek (F6) and Talisker Conservation Park (D7) are close.

The port area is the base for Kangaroo Island Sealink ferry service. There is a boat ramp for launching boats and fishing is popular. You can also see the lighthouse here.

Morgan's Beach is a popular fishing and swimming cove with steep sand hills that are a favourite of children.

**Fishery Beach** is a popular fishing beach that was home to a whaling station in the 1840s/1850s and some ruins remain. In 1862 it became a shipping port for the export of ore from the nearby Talisker Mine. On clear days Kangaroo Island can be seen. This is also the point where the submarine cable leaves the mainland and feeds power along the seabed to the Dudley Peninsula on Kangaroo Island.

Starfish Hill Wind Farm is located across two hills on the tip of the Fleurieu Peninsula near Cape Jervis. It is the first wind farm built in South Australia. There are 23 wind turbines with 15 located on Salt Creek Hill and 8 on Star Fish Hill. Each of the turbines has 3 blades with a tower height of 68 metres and overall height of 100 metres from the ground to the blade tip. It provides enough Energy to meet the needs of about 18,000 households (ie. 2% of the State's residential customers) and adds 1% to the available generation capacity in South Australia. Fishing charters are available departing from Cape Jervis and Wirring Ask at the Visitor Information Centre for a list of operators.

It is also a good spot for swimming. A walk along the path from the jetty will reveal the intensely folded rock strata which was buckled and moulded into this spectacular formation millions of years ago.

Second Valley Beach is one of the most photographed beaches along the Fleurieu Coast. With stunning views of the coastline and unique geological formations it is popular for swimming, jetty fishing, snorkelling and scuba diving.

# **Torrens Vale H4**

KINGSCOTE

Situated halfway between Bald Hills (H4) and Parawa (G5), Torrens Vale, previously known as Dairy Flat, is now a ghost town. It was named a township in 1863. In its heyday it could boast Wesleyan and Bible Christian churches, two cemeteries, a general store, 1954. Stop in at the lookout along Torrens Vale Road, take in the views and read about the history of this tiny town.

# Wirrina Cove F4

Home of the resort and marina overlooking St Vincent's Gulf. The resort is spread over 1200 acres and boasts an excellent function and conference centre. Marina St Vincent is the main launching place for diving on the Ex-HMAS Hobart wreck.

Marina St Vincent is the base for many fishing charter operators and there is a boat ramp for recreational fishers.

# Yankalilla 😅

The pretty Bungala River flows through the township of Yankalilla. It is one of the larger towns but has retained its old village atmosphere. Take a walk along the tree-lined streets of the town to admire the rural architecture and many cottage gardens. In recent years the Shrine of Our Lady of Yankalilla has attracted tens of thousands of pilgrims to the town, along with journalists and documentary makers. Yankalilla is also home to a number of art, craft and bric-a-brac stores, and the first country Josephite school opened by Saint Mary MacKillop in 1867.
